The two dozen-plus courses on and around the South Carolina resort island obviously help, but this lowcountry outpost is also agreeably middlebrow, a cross between scholarly Pinehurst and raucous Myrtle Beach. • Harbour Town Golf Links. A larger-than-life presence in the pantheon of golf course architecture, thanks in part to its red-and-white-striped lighthouse, Pete Dye's Ocean Course design annually hosts the RBC Heritage PGA tournament. It's also a model of conscientious usage of the island's exotic ecosystem. • Palmetto Dunes Oceanfront Golf Resort. Another multi-course resort, the pick here is the Arthur Hills design, which flows over a series of rolling dunes. Other worthy layouts are by George Fazio and Robert Trent Jones. • Golden Bear Golf Club at Indigo Run. More of a parkland layout than others on the island, the course's water features consist of lagoons and wetlands. Nicklaus designed Indigo Run on a tight site, in close collaboration with Bruce Borland, an associate who perished in the same aviation mishap as Payne Stewart. Inn at Harbour Town, Sea Pines Resort. True, there are myriad options in a place like Hilton Head, but there's no better way to soak up the character of the place. Unassuming Southern Hospitality. Attractions include the recreational – cycling, deep-sea fishing, dolphin tours -- and the cultural, especially the region's considerable Civil War history. Hilton Head Island can certainly be enjoyed as a self-contained destination, but it's also just 20 miles northeast of Savannah, Ga., a singular southern urban environment well worth a visit. A rthur "Red" Hoffman was considered a walking encyclopedia of Met Area golf throughout his 50-plus years covering the game as a journalist for the Star Ledger and publicist for renowned architect Robert Trent Jones Sr.

In fact, Pulitzer Prize-winning writer Dave Anderson of the *New York Times* once said of his good friend, "You could ask Red anything about Metropolitan Area golf or golf in general; he just knew it, didn't even have to look it up. He could remember putts from 35 years ago."

In addition to the many honors he was recognized with throughout his celebrated career (he received the MGA's Distinguished Service Award in 1990), his legacy is carried alive with the playing of the annual Red Hoffman Cup Matches, an interclub competition that's celebrating its 10th anniversary in 2014.

What started in 2005 as the "A-Team Matches" (and only consisting of four northern New Jersey clubs), the Hoffman Cup now has 32 clubs that participate every year.

Bob Corbett, a member and team captain of Plainfield Country Club (where Red was named an honorary member), pitched the idea of naming the matches after the man who knew just about everything about New Jersey golf.

"With its great courses and interesting personalities, this region has had some amazing golf stories to tell," said competition director Kevin Casey. "For over 50 years Red Hoffman was the person who told them. It's a natural to name these matches after someone who served New Jersey golf so well for so long."

Cameron's CCUP

resh off the heels of his second collegiate victory of the season at the Western Intercollegiate on April 13th, Cameron Wilson of Rowayton, Conn., was selected to represent the United States on the prestigious Palmer Cup team.

The Palmer Cup, a Ryder Cup style competition that pits 10 of the finest U.S. college golfers against 10 from Europe, will be played on June 26-28 at Walton Heath Golf Club in Surrey, England.

While the news will prohibit Wilson, currently No. 8 in the World Amateur Golf Rankings, from defending his Ike championship (he won the last two Ikes), it does put him in the same breath as some of the best to ever tee it up at the collegiate level.

Wilson actually held the No. 1 spot in the Palmer Cup rankings for several weeks and just a day before being officially named to the name, he was recognized as one of the 10 semifinalists for the Ben Hogan Award, annually given to the best college golfer.





t's the dream of every golfer to sink the winning putt on the 72nd hole at The Masters. For several youngsters, that dream was nearly made a reality on the Sunday before the tournament began.

Thirteen-year-old Sean Haselton of Sayville, N.Y. was one of the competitors who advanced through local and regional qualifying to make it to the finals of the inaugural Drive, Chip and Putt competition, which took place on the hallowed grounds of Augusta National Golf Club.

Haselton, who plays on the Sayville High School varsity golf team as an eight grader, drove down to Georgia with his parents and three siblings and finished seventh (out of 11 golfers) in the Boys' 12-13 Division.

"The course was really, really nice," he told Mark Herrmann of Newsday. "You see it on TV, but it's even better in real life.

the McMasters

white Beeches Head Professional Jim McGovern has been one of the most recognizable and accomplished players in the Met Area for the past 30 years. But aside from all his local accolades, there was one week in 1994 that the '93 Shell Houston Open champ won't ever forget...

Here are five things McGovern remembers most about his first trip to Augusta:

- A memorable practice round with Fred Funk on the Sunday before the tournament helped loosen Jim up and calm his nerves. "That's something I'll never forget...we went out at 6 p.m. and had a blast going through Amen Corner. We were just having so much fun."
- Playing conditions in the first round were brutal, as McGovern hit driver, 5- iron into the first green. "That was before they moved the tees back and made a lot of changes." He hit driver, wedge onto the green the following three rounds.
- Jim has a huge family, and all eight of his brothers and sisters made the trip to Augusta. When Jim's dad was notified that they were only given four passes for the week, two-time Masters champ Ben Crenshaw overheard the news and generously provided the McGoverns with extra passes.
- Jim easily recalls every shot he hit like it was yesterday, and he says that's what makes the Masters special. "I don't know if it's a feather in my cap or a nice accolade on my resume but its something I'll never forget. "It truly was my favorite week in golf."
- Getting a Masters invite wasn't easy, and Jim credits a lot of his success on the PGA Tour to the Met Area courses he grew up playing and to his wins at the '88 Met Open and '89 Met Amateur. "We have the best courses in the entire world in the Met Area."
