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AJUMP BACK in Time

ake Placid? Maybe the Catskills or the Poconos? All likely first guesses for where this 90-foot, wooden ski jump once stood, but it was actually right here in the Met Area – and at a country club!

For several years in the 1920s, the structure took ground atop a hill on North Jersey Country Club's old 10th hole, aiming toward the 18th hole pond. The jump – which was the first ski jump in the New York Metropolitan area – earned the club consideration as the "Lake Placid of the Metropolitan section" and led the club to host championships for the Swedish Ski Club of New York City. Norwegian titleholder Ole

Jansen won the meet all three years (1925-27) with *The New York Times* reporting that 3,000 spectators attended the inaugural event.

The structure served as one part of the club's highly active winter season. Members ice skated on the 18th hole pond and the club even had a hockey team—The Ice Hounds—that was made up of former college players and was good enough to enter Olympic tryouts. The club also encouraged skiing and tobogganing, while an orchestra provided the sweet serenade for Saturday evening dances.

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
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

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






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Semi-Centennial Snapshots

s 2018 comes to an end, members from Fairview Country Club look back on the golf season fondly having celebrated a milestone year. The club's origins trace to its 1904 founding in Bronxville, N.Y., and include more than 60 years in Elmsford, N.Y., but the club and its Robert Trent Jones-designed golf course have firmly established roots in Greenwich, Conn., with 2018 marking its 50th year at the location.

"Despite the very rainy summer, we had more rounds played and more dinners served than in the last five years," notes past president Fredric Apter, a Fairview member since 1954. For Apter, relationships with members and club staff stand out about being a member at Fairview, as he says that friendships "span anywhere from sixty years to 18 months," thanks to more than 75 new families joining the club during the latter span of time.

The club in 2018 enjoyed its first full season in a newly renovated clubhouse, while many feel as if the course played better in 2018 than ever before. "Fairview is a very beautiful course," says Apter, citing how the club's respect for the history of its trees and their integral role throughout the course has helped maintain the original design for playability. Though minor tweaks have been made through the years additional tees on the third and seventh holes most recently, and creation of family and mixed tees - one can see how shot values have remained true to Jones' original intent when comparing photos from 1968 and 2018.





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REMEMBERMG James R. Hand

ames R. "Jim" Hand passed away on November 13th at the age of 101. While he has not lived in the Met Area for many years, his contributions to the game here and on the national level will be felt for many years to come.

Jim Hand started his connection to golf as a caddie and junior player at North Fork Country Club on the East End of Long Island. He would later say that, "every good thing in my life came from caddieing." This experience spurred a lifelong connection to golf and service to the game that he learned to love as a young caddie.

A longtime member and former president of Sleepy Hollow Country Club, Hand also served as president of the Westchester Golf Association and their highly successful caddie scholarship fund. He also served on the MGA Executive Committee and received the Association's highest honor – its Distinguished Service Award – in 1986. He and his family were honored with the Met Golf Writer's Family of the Year Award in 1965. Nationally, Hand went on to serve on the **USGA Executive Committee, where he chaired the** Championship Committee and was elected president in 1984. Jim was also a member of Winged Foot Golf Club and during his presidency oversaw a highly successful U.S. Open at Winged Foot. He directed the USGA's first-ever Capital Campaign that helped raise significant funds for turfgrass research, the USGA headquarters building and Museum, and created an Endowment for the Future of Golf.
